#### SUMMARY:

The magical island of Lesvos lived up to its name once again. This year's unseasonal good weather was an excellent break from the harsh British and US weather but meant there were fewer birds than normal for this time of year. We did however see most of our target birds and of course many sought after migrants that readily pass through this beautiful island. Add to this rare butterflies, dragonflies, orchids and flowers then it's no wonder people come back time and time again. Our tour was once again timed to get a good variety of the spring migrants that are heading north from their wintering grounds. We were not disappointed and enjoyed superb views of most of the birds we saw. The two star birds, Kruper's Nuthatch and Cinereous Bunting were easily seen, and a wealth of other sought after species duly obliged. Of special note was the four Rufous-tailed Robins we found with three sat next to each other on a fence! Three Scops-Owls in one spot and a Long-eared Owl with chicks was a delight as was the evening light and ever changing birds around the saltpans, all adding wonderful memories to this wonderful holiday. As ever the tour was enriched by the camaraderie of many of our fellow birders. We will return again next year to see what wonderful surprises await us. ### 27th April 2013

Most of our group arrived on an early morning flight where we were greeted by the beginnings of a warm sunny and clear day. After working our way through the narrow streets of Mytilini we were on our way toward to small fishing village of Skala Kalloni. After an hour we arrived at our hotel and were soon tucking into a very welcome breakfast. We then went out for a couple of hours introductory birding. It soon became apparent that both Corn Buntings and Crested Larks were common and were to be seen almost anywhere and every day. We first drove to the Tsiknias River (East River) and soon found our first groups of Squacco Herons feeding out in the open shallow water. A Black Stork stood out amongst the many Yellow-legged Gulls in the river mouth and several Common Terns flew past while our first **Eastern Olivaceous Warbler** sang from a nearby bush. Moving slowly along we located plenty of Wood Sandpipers, and then a brief stop had us out of the minibus to get superb views of Black-headed Wagtails, a Red-backed Shrike and our first stunning looking male **Black-headed Bunting**. At another spot we watched up to six Red-throated Pipits, most in their fine breeding colours. A Little Ringed Plover was found and nearby on the main salt pans a huge flock of several hundred Greater Flamingos looked superb in the morning light. Scanning this area we soon found Little Terns. Common Terns and a flock of **Pied Avocets**. We then returned to the hotel for lunch. After a little rest, well we had been up for some 24hrs, we went out for a few more hours. On the Tsiknias River we watched a female **Little Bittern**, then further on a nice group of Collared Pratincoles flying overhead, and several Whinchat, before getting to the sheep fields where we enjoyed perfect light conditions as we found 2 Stonecurlew, several Black Storks, a Greater Short-toed Lark in song flight and then perched. Then 30 or so Glossy Ibis came in and landed in the distant grasses. Also in the grassy areas were Little and Temminck's Stints, Kentish Plover, a Spoonbill that flew over, four or more Black Storks, two Ruddy Shelduck, Grey Heron, Red-backed Shrikes including a nice male, and on closer inspection we found good numbers of Dark Spreadwings and a few Red-veined **Darters** in and around the grasses. We returned to the hotel later in the day, tired from the journey to Lesvos but delighted with the sightings from our first day and filled with anticipation of what the next days could hold.

#### 28th April 2013

This morning before breakfast we made a visit to Metochi Lake (Inland Lake). It's always best to visit early morning and we were not disappointed as we found at least 10 Little Bitterns, 4 Little Crakes, Red-rumped Swallows, Little Grebe, 12 or more Black-crowned Night Herons, Squacco Herons, several Sedge Warblers, and a couple of Great Reed Warblers that showed well. After a while, one

of the Little Crakes, a nice male sat right out in open preening on top of some flattened reeds. After breakfast we headed west. Our first stop though was just five minutes away where we found a fluffy white Long-eared Owl chick sat on its nest. Nearby we found the adult bird and after working out where we could get a clear view of it, we enjoyed super views as it sat out in the morning sun. In the same area a Scops-Owl was showing itself off as it roosted against a tree trunk, and on another tree a cute Persian **Squirrel** put on a show. After this we continued our journey west with our first stop offering Woodchat Shrike, Subalpine Warbler, and some flyover Black Storks. Next we visited an area nicknamed the Grand Canyon where we checked out the rocky crags and soon found a male Blue Rock Thrush, several Eurasian Crag Martins flying around and giving great views, a Western Rock Nuthatch was found and then a singing Rock Sparrow posed on top of one of the crags. Others birds here included Black-eared Wheatear, Cirl Bunting, and a singing Cretchzmar's **Bunting**. Moving on toward Ipsilou we stopped to look at a hillside with scattered boulders and ideal habitat for our target bird the Isabelline Wheatear. While watching these, a Short-toed Eagle soared by and a Peregrine Falcon was see. We soon found a couple of Isabelline Wheatears and while watching these performing their song flights we also saw a European Roller and plenty more Black-eared Wheatears, Long-legged Buzzard and a Common Kestrel.

Moving on again we drove to quiet secluded beach at Sigri where we had our picnic lunch. Along the beach and surrounding scrub were two Lesser Grey Shrikes, Redbacked Shrikes, Black-headed Buntings and a Tawny Pipit, while on a beach pool were some Little Stints. Yellow Wagtails and a Little Ringed Plover. Nearby a small ford crossing a stream was surprisingly quiet except for a Little Bittern and a couple of Wood Sandpipers. We made a short walk along a track but it was birdless and our only creature of note was a Giant Peacock Moth.

Leaving the area we worked our way slowly back toward Skala Kalloni stopping for a group of 6 Lesser Kestrels performing exceptionally well as they hovered and hunted over the grassy hills. Also here were a few Common Kestrels for comparison and a Marsh Harrier flew high above. Our last stop of the day near the Petrified Forest produced a Woodchat Shrike, a superb male Montagu's Harrier, as well as Little Owl and then by Ipsilou Monastery we watched some **Masked Shrikes** and a couple of Alpine Swifts.

## 29th April 2013

Today we checked the Tsiknias (West) River before breakfast getting good views of a singing Nightingale, a

few Kentish Plovers, Black Storks and 13 Little Stints.

After breakfast we worked our way to the Tsiknias (East)
River seeing a Grey Heron, lots of Squacco Herons,
Little Ringed Plovers, and both Common and Scarce
Swallowtail Butterflies. A few male Black-headed
Buntings posed nicely on riverside bushes and a Cetti's
Warblers sat in open view proved that they are not always
elusive. We got good views of Eastern Olivaceous
Warbler sat out and a distant Little Owl sat on a wire.
From the hide overlooking the salt pans we watched a flock
of Ruff, plus the usual Wood Sandpipers, Black-winged
Stilts, Little Ringed Plovers, Flamingos and Pied
Avocets. Further searching revealed a couple of Whinchats
and a Eurasian Spoonbill.

Today we took our lunch overlooking the bay from a tavern in the pleasant fishing village of Skala Kalloni. We returned to the hotel and enjoyed the antics of the nesting House Martins and then later set off to Achladeri Forest. We logged three Common Buzzards along the way. On our arrival in the small patch of pine forest we were greeted by one of the star breeding birds of the island a male **Krüper's** Nuthatch which called in the tree right above heads. We then watched the female sticking her head out of the nest hole in an old stump nearby. After an hour or so of watching the birds we decided to take a walk through the woods. Here we had to track down a pair of calling Shorttoed Treecreepers which we eventually saw well. On our way back to Kalloni we made a stop in the salt pans where the afternoon light was stunning an lit up the **Flamingos**, Ruff and Avocets. Four White-winged Terns were a highlight and a couple of Little Terns flew along the waterway beside us.

#### 30th April 2013

This morning we did our pre breakfast walk around the sheep fields. Highlights were a pair of **Stone-curlew** seen well amongst the sheep, while the bushes held a Lesser Whitethroat, and nearby Greater Short-toed Lark, and a couple of Red-throated Pipits flying over. A Eurasian Oystercatcher was seen in the surf just offshore and was the first ever seen on this tour. After breakfast we drove north to a site for breeding **Rüppell's Warblers**. We enjoyed great views of a male plus a female Eastern Orphean Warbler, singing Subalpine Warblers, a fine looking Black-eared Wheatear and a surprise Harbour **Porpoise** close inshore. A quick roadside stop allowed great views of some perched Red-rumped Swallows. We moved on along the north coastal track where there were a few Red-backed Shrikes, Cretzschmar's Buntings, Eurasian Turtle Doves, (wild) Rock Doves, Eurasian Collared Doves, Black-eared Wheatears, and nice looks at a Black-headed Bunting perched on a power line. Butterflies were in evidence here taking advantage of the

warmth of the sun and here we saw Painted Lady, Eastern Festoon, Scarce Swallowtail, Common Blue, Clouded Yellow, and even a Broad-bodied Chaser dragonfly.

We enjoyed a fabulous taverna lunch in the seaside village of Skala Sikaminias in the company of countless cats before continuing inland traversing the middle of the island. We stopped for a White Stork nesting on a chimney stack and then drove to the Napi Valley where roadside stops produced Common Cuckoo, Eurasian Hoopoe, a colourful flock of European Bee-eaters, Cretzschmar's Buntings, a female Cirl Bunting and a **Sombre Tit**. At one point we checked a small stream only to find an **Ortolan Bunting** that flew in and drank briefly before disappearing. We also checked the salt pans and sheep fields on the way back to the hotel and added **Cormorant** for the day and had good views of up to six Black Storks. A Spur-thighed Tortoise was found in the grasses and on closer inspection some of us got to see the spurs!

#### 01st May 2013

Before breakfast we revisited the inland Metochi Lake. As expected there were several Little Bitterns plus a very showing female Little Crake and brief views of two others. There were Black-crowned Night Herons at the far end of the lake and Reed, Sedge and Great Reed Warblers were seen and heard. A Blackcap was new for the trip and we were treated to amazing views of some low flying Common Swifts.

After breakfast we drove the coastal road west towards Sigri picking up a few Little Owls enroute (at least five seen today). Roadside stops produced Cinereous Bunting, lots of Cretzschmar's Buntings, a Common Cuckoo, Long-legged Buzzards and a Short-toed Eagle. Blackeared Wheatears were seen, a male Red-backed Shrike showed well, and another Sombre Tit was seen. In another spot we got great views of a male Collared Flycatcher, fleeting views of Orphean Warbler and many more Red-backed Shrikes and a few Stonechats.

Moving on to a fig orchards we had several **Spotted Flycatchers, Pied Flycatcher** and a **Collared Flycatcher**that got away. Two **Lesser Grey Shrikes** were seen well
and there was another **Sombre Tit** and an unusually pale
headed **Short-toed Eagle**. We stopped for a quick ice
cream break in Sigri and then headed toward the ford
stopping to see a perched **Red-footed falcon**. Here there
were also **Lesser Kestrels** overhead and a flock of 40+ **European Bee-eaters** perched and flying around a large
tree. Down by the ford were **Wood Sandpipers**, a **Ruff**, a **Temminck's Stint** and some more perched **European Bee-eaters**. Pleased with our discoveries here, we drove

back to the salt pans in time for a flock of 30 Whiskered Terns, at least two White-winged Terns, and a Eurasian Spoonbill amongst the Greater Flamingos. A large flock of shorebirds included Wood Sandpipers, countless Ruff, at least 40 Little Stints, and two brightly coloured Curlew Sandpipers.

#### 02nd May 2013

This morning we went to the Tsiknias River (East River). In addition to the usual Black-headed and Corn Buntings, there were at least eight **Temminck's Stints** and a few **Purple Herons** seen from the west side of the river. A black headed Yellow Wagtail foraged along the river edge and some Little Ringed Plovers were seen by the muddy edges. We moved around to the other side and found a Little Gull flying along the beach near the river mouth. A Greater Short-toed Lark foraged in the grass and a Red-backed **Shrike** was perched up. We scanned the vegetation in the distance and came up with a **Rufous Bush Robin** perched on a distant tree singing. Scope views confirmed it though it was far away. We then moved back toward the river and were surprised to find three more Rufous Bush Robins and watched them at amazingly close range as they interacted and then landed on a fence wire all together. Fantastic! Our pre-breakfast walk was capped off by two White Storks that flew over Skala Kalloni village.

After breakfast we headed along the eastern side of the Gulf of Kalloni toward Polichnitos.

A number of **Great** and **Little Egrets** were seen along the way as well as a Grey Heron. A stop just past Achladeri Forest found us a **Serin** at the top of an evergreen and some **European Greenfinches**. We made our way into an olive tree plantation and had varying views of an Olive Tree Warbler that was nesting in one of the groves. A Blackbilled Magpie made a very brief appearance in another tree but otherwise the olive grove was quiet. On the way out we had two female and two male **Red-footed Falcons** perched on some power lines showing very nicely. At the salt pans we had nice views of Curlew Sandpipers, Little Stints and **Ruff** and then we continued on toward the coastal village of Vatera. A tavern lunch overlooking the sea in Vatera had us looking at some very active Bottle-nosed Dolphins and several groups of Yelkouan Shearwaters flying just off shore. After lunch we moved up along the coast and found a couple of Sardinian Warblers and an Eastern Olivaceous Warbler that showed well for us. A couple of nice Holy Orchids were a good find. Heading back through the Polichnitos Salt pans we had good looks at the waders again and then we returned to the Kalloni Salt Pans to bird in the fantastic afternoon light. The light was indeed glorious and the salt pans were full of birds including several gorgeous Curlew Sandpipers, more than a dozen Black-tailed Godwits, many Ruff, Little Stints, two Spotted

Redshank, Grey Plover, Pied Avocets, Gull-billed Tern, Little Tern, White-winged and Whiskered Terns, Spotted Redshanks, Spoonbill, Black Storks, Yellow-legged Gulls, Ruddy Shelduck, and Common Shelduck. Finally seven White Storks flew over adding to the spectacle. We ended this splendid day with dinner at a Taverna in town and a review of some of the fabulous birds seen.

#### 03rd May 2013

This morning before breakfast we once again visited the Tsiknias River (East River) and the sheep fields and found Temminck's Stints, Black Storks, Greater Short-toed Larks, and a Common Chiffchaff among other things. There were three Eurasian Curlew working the sand bar at the mouth of the river and a Tree Pipit and a few Redthroated Pipits on the way out. A Common Snipe was hanging around with several Wood Sandpipers in the marsh and most people got on it before it did a disappearing act in grass. After breakfast we stopped at the Kalloni Raptor Watch Point where we scanned across the valley and found Eurasian Sparrowhawk, Common Kestrel, Long-legged Buzzard, Common Buzzard, Eurasian Hobby, and Shorttoed Eagle. A Northern Goshawk flew across and swung up above the horizon giving definitive views. There were **Cirl Buntings** singing from the tops of bushes and an Orphean Warbler showed well for us. We then made our way to the Soccer Field where we found three Scops Owls perched up in the trees. Moving on to the Fila masts we had nice looks at Subalpine Warbler, Red-backed Shrike, and Cirl Bunting, and with patience, a Bonelli's Warbler, a close **Hobby**, several nice butterflies, a dung beetle, and an active group of Long-tailed Tits. Our lunch stop was at Skala Kalloni beach and then we drove slowly along the upper Tsiknias River (East River) and had more views of Temminck's Stint, White Stork, and some European Beeeaters flitting around the power lines. We next moved up to the Napi Valley and found more **Hoopoes** before heading back to the Kalloni Salt Pans to enjoy a last evening there. Again the light was stunning and lit up White-winged Terns, Whiskered Terns, at least four Purple Herons, an interesting identification challenge of a 1<sup>st</sup> year **Montagu's** Harrier, Common Greenshanks, Ruddy Turnstones, Grey Plover, and the gorgeous flock of pink Flamingos. Working back toward the hotel along the river we had a lovely Little Bittern. Our final dinner at the hotel included a review of the highlights of the trip which are noted at the beginning of this report.

#### 04th May 2013

After an early breakfast we set off to Mytilini airport for our flights home. It was a great week full of good birds, butterflies, good food, good fun, picturesque villages and some wonderful sunshine!
