## **BIRD SPECIES:**

- 1. Slaty-breasted Tinamou Cypturellus boucardi Heard calling on river trip by Olbin and some of the rest of us.
- Plain Chachalaca Ortalis vetula Seen briefly but not by all of us at LPB on our first full day, near the Toucan Tower.
- 3. Neotropic Cormorant *Phalacrocorax brasilianus* Several seen at CYS mostly flying past our boats.
- 4. Anhinga Anhinga anhinga Seen during the train ride at CYS.
- 5. Magnificent Frigatebird *Fregata magnificens* Outstanding pick up by Dot as it flew high over the road at LBG.
- 6. Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias Seen flying over the marsh on the train ride to CYS.
- 7. Great Egret Ardea alba Many observed throughout the trip.
- 8. Snowy Egret Egretta thula Frequently observed along the roadside and in wetlands.
- 9. Little Blue Heron Egretta caerulea Commonly seen, particularly on the train ride to CYS.
- 10. Tricolored Heron Egretta tricolor Several seen, especially on the train ride to CYS.
- 11. Cattle Egret Bubulcus ibis Commonly seen as we rode along in the Gus Bus.
- 12. Green Heron Butorides virescens Seen well at CYS but also in RAV.
- 13. Yellow-crowned Night-Heron Nyctanassa violacea Immature seen closely at CYS.
- 14. Boat-billed Heron Cochlearius cochlearius Two seen excellently at CYS.
- 15. White Ibis Eudocimus albus One seen by Olbin and some of the rest of us on the train ride to CYS.
- 16. Wood Stork Mycteria americana Good scope look at a single bird at a stop in RAV.
- 17. Black Vulture *Coragyps atratus* A ubiquitous bird of tropical skies, fields, roadsides. Seen daily and often.
- 18. Turkey Vulture Cathartes aura Almost as ubiquitous as the previous species, seen daily.
- 19. Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture *Cathartes burrovianus* Seen very well with other vultures on the boat ride at CYS.
- 20. Gray Hawk *Asturina nitida* Seen twice but best view was a bird flying low, circling at LBG as we birded the road.

- 21. Common Black-Hawk Buteogallus anthracinus Seen twice, at CYS and at LBG.
- 22. Great Black-Hawk *Buteogallus urubitinga* Immature atop a distant tree (but fine scope look) observed from the Toucan Tower on our first day at LPB.
- 23. Roadside Hawk Buteo magnirostris Seen well at various places around CYS and RAV.
- 24. Broad-winged Hawk Buteo platypterus Heard by Olbin and the rest of us at LPB on our first morning there.
- 25. Short-tailed Hawk Buteo brachyurus Seen soaring on the river trip at CYS and again from the road at LBG.
- 26. Crested Caracara *Caracara cheriway* Several seen flying and perched on train ride to CYS but outstanding view of one perched roadside in RAV.
- 27. American Kestrel Falco sparverius Several seen perched on utility wires in RAV.
- 28. Bat Falcon Falco rufigularis One observed perched high against the sun at CYS.
- 29. Sungrebe Heliornis fulica One seen deep among mangrove roots by a few of us at CYS.
- 30. Northern Jacana *Jacana spinosa* Seen commonly in marsh during train ride and seen very well from boats at CYS.
- 31. Spotted Sandpiper Actitus macularius Seen well in river stop in RAV.
- 32. Least Sandpiper *Calidris minutilla* Several briefly seen by a few of us in flight by from the train on the way to CYS.
- 33. Rock Pigeon *Patagioenas livia* Many observed on our various perambulations. Particularly abundant in La Ceiba. We noted how many are prominently white with other markings (as illustrated in new field guide to Northern Central America).
- 34. Pale-vented Pigeon *Patagioenas cayennensis* Observed at LPB, RAV, and LBG, usually high in a tree or as a flyover.
- 35. Red-billed Pigeon *Patagioenas flavirostris* A highly user-friendly visitor to the feeders at LPB, easily seen and enjoyed.
- 36. White-winged Dove *Zenaida asiatica* Very common on wires and here and there along roadsides. Well observed while we awaited the train.
- 37. Inca Dove *Columbina inca* Commonly observed at our various stops around towns. Heard mournfully calling at CYS.
- 38. Common Ground-Dove *Columbina passerina* Not as common as Ruddy Ground-Dove but seen well at RAV and LBG.
- 39. Ruddy Ground-Dove *Columbina talpacoti* -- The most common and easily seen of the various ground doves. We saw them frequently along the roads and field.
- 40. Gray-chested Dove Leptotila cassini Some of us got to see this furtive dove at LPB on the walk to the falls.
- 41. Olive-throated Parakeet Aratinga nana Pairs seen allopreening at LPB and at LBG.
- 42. Brown-hooded Parrot *Pionopsitta haematotis* A flock screeching by seen on the first day at LPB from the Toucan Tower.
- 43. White-crowned Parrot Pionus senilis Seen very well but usually perched treetop around the LPB.

- 44. White-fronted Parrot Amazona albifrons Olbin pointed out the species to us at the HER.
- 45. Red-lored Parrot Amazona autumnalis Seen from the boats as it flew across the river at CYS.
- 46. Mangrove Cuckoo Coccyzus minor Excellent views as the bird climbed atop a mangrove at CYS.
- 47. Squirrel Cuckoo Piaya cayana Heard frequently around LPB and elsewhere and finally seen at SNR.
- 48. Lesser Roadrunner *Geococcyx velox* -- Observed two birds very well along the road leading into the Honduran Emerald Reserve.
- 49. Groove-billed Ani *Crotophaga sulcirostris* Seen frequently in small groups along the roadside in brushy fields.
- 50. Vermiculated Screech-Owl *Megascops guatemalae* Good looks at two birds roosting in forest at LPB, a red morph and a gray morph.
- 51. Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl *Glaucidium brasilianum* **Heard**, responded to Olbin's tape at Rio Santiago Nature Resort but never showed itself.
- 52. Common Pauraque *Nyctidromus albiollis* Brief look by some of us of one bird on the road as we were returning to LPB.
- 53. Great Potoo Nyctibius grandis Seen well perched atop a snag on our first outing at LPB. Great scope looks.
- 54. White-collared Swift *Streptoprocne zonaris* Many were coursing about over the river at CYS, affording excellent looks.
- 55. Long-billed Hermit *Phaethornis longirostris* Easy to see well as it frequented feeders at LPB and SNR.
- 56. Stripe-throated Hermit *Phaethornis striigularis* Seen here and there around LPB and seen closely at SNR coming to the feeders.
- 57. Scaly-breasted Hummingbird Phaeochroa cuvieri Seen excellently perched and coming to feeders at SNR.
- 58. Violet Sabrewing *Campylopterus hemileucurus* Awesome hummingbird with its prominent white outer tail feathers and brilliant violet plumage, seen daily at LPB and also at SNR.
- 59. White-necked Jacobin *Florisuga mellivora* Another hummer seen daily from the veranda at LPB and also at SNR.
- 60. Brown Violet-Ear Colibri delphinae Observed several at feeders at SNR.
- 61. Green-breasted Mango Anthracothorax prevostii Observed at least one male at SNR coming to feeders.
- 62. Violet-headed Hummingbird Klais guimeti One seen along the trail at LPB on our walk Tuesday afternoon.
- 63. Salvin's Emerald *Chlorostilbon salvini* Observed at the Honduran Emerald Refuge, a small hummer with a slightly forked tail. This is a recent split from Canivet's Emerald, *C. canivetii*.
- 64. Violet Crowned Woodnymph *Thalurania colombica* This gorgeous hummer was seen daily from the veranda at LPB and many were also frequenting the feeders at SNR.
- 65. White-bellied Emerald Amazilia candida Several of these hummers were at the feeders at SNR.
- 66. Honduran Emerald *Amazilia luciae* THE endemic bird species of Honduras. We saw it well several times in our visit to HER.
- 67. Rufous-tailed Hummingbird Amazilia tzacatl This is a widespread hummer of Central and South America

- and we saw them often and well from the veranda at LPB and at SNR.
- 68. Cinnamon Hummingbird *Amazilia rutila* Our finest views of this colorful hummer were as it visited the Euphorbias at the HER. Some of us also saw it at the airport in San Pedro Sula.
- 69. Stripe-tailed Hummingbird Eupherusa eximia At least one was visiting the feeders at SNR.
- 70. Purple-crowned Fairy *Heliothryx barroti* This truly exquisite hummer was a treat to see from the Toucan Tower on our first morning at LPB. We also saw it well the next day and again on our walk at Lancetilla.
- 71. Ruby-throated Hummingbird *Archilochus colubris* Our eastern North American hummingbird was perched high atop a tree at HER.
- 72. Black-headed Trogon *Trogon melanocephalus* We all got to see this yellow-bellied trogon well on our first day at LPB and again at Lancetilla.
- 73. Black-throated Trogon Trogo rufus Briefly observed by some of us on our first day at LPB.
- 74. Slaty-tailed Trogon *Trogon massena* We could not have asked for better views of this red-breasted trogon as we gazed upon a male in sunlight on our first walk at LPB.
- 75. Lesson's Motmot *Momotus lessonii* We had to wait until our final breakfast on the veranda at LPB for this bird to finally put in an appearance. It is a recent split from the widespread Blue-crowned Motmot (*M. momota*). It has also been called the Blue-diademed Motmot.
- 76. Turquoise-browed Motmot Eumomota superciliosa Some of us had brief looks at one bird on a utility wire on our drive from San Pedro Sula to LPB. We saw it better (though backlit), also on a utility wire on our drive through Rio Aguan Valley.
- 77. Ringed Kingfisher Ceryle torquatus Good looks at this mega-kingfisher on our boat ride at CYS.
- 78. Belted Kingfisher *Ceryle alcyon* This species is a winter visitor to Honduras. Several were seen briefly at CYS.
- 79. Amazon Kingfisher *Chloroceryle amazona* This is the largest of the Neotropical "green" kingfisher complex and we saw it well at CYS.
- 80. Green Kingfisher *Chloroceryle americana* We saw a pair of these small kingfishers (which reach the USA in the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas) on our boat ride at CYS.
- 81. White-necked Puffbird *Notharchus macrorhynchos* We had great looks at this big puffbird perched atop a riverside tree at CYS.
- 82. Collared Aracari *Pteroglossus torquatus* One of the first species we encountered on our first day at LPB. Seen very well by all.
- 83. Keel-billed Toucan *Ramphastos sulfuratus* We had several nice long looks at this iconistic species of the American tropics. It was seen well at LPB and at LBG. Dot and Martha watched two doing courtship behavior from the ridge platform along Las Pilas trail.
- 84. Black-cheeked Woodpecker *Melanerpes pucherani* We had very nice looks at this species on our first day at LPB. We saw it the next day too.
- 85. Golden-fronted Woodpecker *Melanerpes aurifrons* This is the common "ladder-backed" woodpecker of Northern Central America. We saw it well in several places, recording it on all four of our full days in the field.
- 86. Smoky-Brown Woodpecker *Veniliornis fumigatus* We had outstanding looks at a pair foraging in a tree along the roadside at Lancetilla.

- 87. Chestnut-colored Woodpecker *Celeus castaneus* This attractive woodpecker whose genus, *Celeus*, is very well represented in the Neotropics, was seen well around LPB and we all saw it on our first morning in the field. It was even coming to the feeders around the lodge.
- 88. Lineated Woodpecker *Dryocopus lineatus* A few of us got fair to middling looks at a flying Lineated during the train ride to CYS.
- 89. Buff-throated Foliage-Gleaner *Automolus ochrolaemus* **Heard** and pointed out by Olbin at CYS. No one saw it.
- 90. Wedge-billed Woodcreeper *Glyphorynchus spirurus* Seen on our trail walk on Tuesday afternoon at LPB. The smallest of the woodcreepers.
- 91. Ivory-billed Woodcreeper *Xiphorhychus flavigaster* Most of us had good looks at this fairly sizeable and well-named woodcreeper on our first morning walk at LPB.
- 92. Streak-headed Woodcreeper *Lepidocolaptes souleyetii* We had quick looks at this species on our trail walk on Tuesday afternoon at the LPB.
- 93. Barred Antshrike *Thamnophilus doliatus* Responding to Olbin's playback, a male and female pair of this widely distributed species gave us fairly good looks in a thicket along the trail at LBG.
- 94. Dusky Antbird *Cercomacra tyrannina* Another widespread species, we heard it along the trail at LBG but only a couple of us actually managed a brief look at this furtive species.
- 95. Northern Beardless Tyrannulet *Camptostoma imberbe* Olbin heard and then found this nondescript little flycatcher atop at tree along the river at CYS. Most, if not all of us, eventually managed looks at it.
- 96. Ochre-bellied Flycatcher *Mionectes oleagineus* We all got introduced to this common and often numerous forest species on our first morning walk at LPB and we encountered it every day thereafter. This is a mainly frugivorous flycatcher that does wing-flicking displays in understory leks in the forest.
- 97. Common Tody-Flycatcher *Todirostrum cinereum* We had good looks at this colorful and small flycatcher during the stop by the river on our day in Rio Aguan Valley.
- 98. Yellow-olive Flycatcher *Tolmomyias sulphurescens* This small and easily overlooked flycatcher of shaded understory was heard on our boat trip and seen by some of us at Lancetilla.
- 99. Yellow-bellied Flycatcher *Epidonax flaviventris* This North American migrant popped up at SNR and gave a brief look.
- 100. Black Phoebe *Sayornis nigricans* One bird was easy to see on a boulder in the river stop we made at RAV.
- 101. Rufous Mourner Rhytipterna holerythra Quick but good looks at LPB.
- 102. Dusky-capped Flycatcher Myjarchus tuberculifer Quick looks at one at Lancetilla.
- 103. Brown-crested Flycatcher Myjarchus tyrannulus One seen at one of our stops at RAV.
- 104. Great Kiskadee *Pitangus sulphuratus* Numerous throughout, observed daily. At least two pairs building nests around LPB.
- 105. Boat-billed Flycatcher Megarhynchus pitangua One seen very well at LPB on our first morning in the field.
- 106. Social Flycatcher Myioizetetes similis Seen daily along roadsides and at lodge.
- 107. Tropical Kingbird *Tyrannus melancholicus* This is one of the most widespread of Neotropical bird species and we saw them commonly along roadsides throughout the week.

- 108. Rose-throated Becard Pachyramphus aglaiae One female seen well at LPB.
- 109. Masked Tityra Tityra semifasciata Seen well both at LPB and at Lancetilla, where we found a nest cavity.
- 110. Black-crowned Tityra *Tityra inquisitor* Seen well on our first day at LPB.
- 111. Lovely Cotinga *Cotinga amabilis* -- Probably the highlight of the trip for most of us was the splendid long looks we had at several of these remarkable birds along the forest edge at LPB in full sunlight.
- 112. White-collared Manakin Manacus candei -- We saw a female at LPB but saw males well at Lancetilla.
- 113. Red-capped Manakin *Pipra mentalis* We saw a female on our first bird walk at LPB. Alas, we never saw a mature male.
- 114. White-eyed Vireo Vireo griseus Heard clearly at Lancetilla but not seen.
- 115. Yellow-throated Vireo Vireo flavifrons Seen at LPB and again at Lancetilla.
- 116. Red-eyed Vireo *Vireo olivaceous* Seen among the many passerines along the forest edge on our first outing at LPB.
- 117. Lesser Greenlet *Hylophilus decurtatus* We got some quick looks at this nondescript bird among the woodwarblers in the trees at Lancetilla.
- 118. Brown Jay *Cyanocorax morio* We observed and heard these ubiquitous jays on each of our full days in the field.
- 119. Gray-breasted Martin *Progne chalybea* Olbin showed some of us one of these Neotropical martins at the river area where we stopped at RAV.
- 120. Mangrove Swallow *Tachycineta albilinea* We saw several of these white-rumped swallows along the river stop at RAV.
- 121. Barn Swallow *Hirundo rustica* We saw many flying around the grassy fields at the airport in San Pedro Sula.
- 122. Spot-breasted Wren *Thryothorus maculipectus* It required a bit of neck dexterity but we got looks at this active wren both at LPB and at LBG.
- 123. Southern House Wren *Troglodytes aedon* This is the Neotropical subspecies of our common North American House Wren. We encountered it at LPB.
- 124. White-bellied Wren *Uropsila leucogastra* One of the specialty species of HER, we managed some quick looks at it among the cactus and acacia.
- 125. White-breasted Wood-Wren *Henicorhina leucosticta* Some of us got looks at this tiny wren active in the foliage on our first morning at LPB.
- 126. Long-billed Gnatwren Ramphocaenus melanurus Heard but not seen at LPB.
- 127. White-lored Gnatcatcher *Polioptila albiloris* Observed well at HER.
- 128. Tropical Gnatcatcher *Polioptila plumbea* Observed well at LBG.
- 129. Swainson's Thrush *Catharus ustulatus* One briefly observed by some of the group on the entrance road to LPB.
- 130. Wood Thrush *Hylocichla mustelina* Heard daily with several sightings at LPB.

- 131. Clay-colored Thrush *Turdus grayi* Seem commonly around the grounds at LPB. Formerly called Clay-colored Robin.
- 132. White-throated Thrush *Turdus assimilis* Seen well on our first walk at LPB and seen subsequently around the lodge and in the forest. Formerly called White-throated Robin.
- 133. Gray Catbird *Dumetella carolinensis* Common in winter months throughout Northern Central America, we saw the species on several occasions at LPB as well as SNR.
- 134. Tropical Mockingbird *Mimus gilvus* Seen briefly at one of our stops in RAV.
- 135. Blue-winged Warbler Vermivora pinus. Seen well at LBG along the roadside.
- 136. Golden-winged Warbler *Vermivora chrysoptera* A single female briefly seen in canopy among other warblers at SNR.
- 137. Tennessee Warbler Oreothlpis peregrina Seen well at SNR.
- 138. Northern Parula Parula americana Seen among other warblers at LBG.
- 139. Yellow Warbler Setophaga petechia Seen several places at RAV and also at LBG.
- 140. Chestnut-sided Warbler *Setophaga pensylvanica* Observed on our walks at LPB and, as well, at LBG and SNR.
- 141. Magnolia Warbler Setophaga magnolia Seen frequently in suitable areas throughout the trip.
- 142. Yellow-rumped Warbler Setophaga coronata One seen at the river stop at RAV.
- 143. Black-throated Green-Warbler Setophaga magnolia Observed on our walks at LPB and at SNR.
- 144. Yellow-throated Warbler Setophaga dominica Seen well low in tree along roadside at LBG.
- 145. American Redstart Setophaga ruticilla Seen often at various places including LPB, CYS, LBG, and SNR.
- 146. Hooded Warbler Setophaga citrina Seen well at LPB and even better at SNR.
- 147. Black-and-white Warbler *Mniotilta varia* Male seen well along the trail at LBG.
- 148. Worm-eating Warbler *Helmitheros vermivorum* One observed foraging in dried leaves during our roadside birding at LBG.
- 149. Ovenbird Seiurus aurocapilla Observed by John and Alan along Las Pilas trail.
- 150. Louisiana Waterthrush Parkesia motacilla One seen well at our first stop at LBG.
- 151. Kentucky Warbler Geothlypis formosa Nice looks along with Hooded Warbler at SNR.
- 152. Gray-crowned Yellowthroat Geothlypis poliocephala Seen at our breakfast stop at RAV.
- 153. Yellow-breasted Chat *Icteria virens* Seen briefly at LBG in shrubs along roadside.
- 154. Red-throated Ant-Tanager Habia fuscicauda Seen and heard on several of our walks at LPB.
- 155. Summer Tanager Piranga rubra Seen on our first morning at LPB and also at RAV and LBG.
- 156. Passerini's Tanager Ramphocelus passerinii Males and females seen well from roadside at LBG.
- 157. Blue-gray Tanager *Thraupis episcopus* Some seen at RAV and at LBG.

- 158. Yellow-winged Tanager Thraupis abbas Seen well at RSN and also around lodge at LPB.
- 159. Golden-hooded Tanager Tangara larvata Very nice looks from veranda at LPB and also at SNR.
- 160. Green Honeycreeper Chlorophanes spiza Outstanding close looks at SNR.
- 161. Shining Honeycreeper Cyanerpes lucidus Outstanding close looks at SNR.
- 162. Red-legged Honeycreeper Cyanerpes cyaneus Seen at SNR.
- 163. Yellow-throated Euphonia Euphonia hirundinacea Male and female seen well at LBG.
- 164. Olive-backed Euphonia *Euphonia gouldi* Seen often around the veranda of LPB as well as other places, including LBG.
- 165. Blue-black Grassquit Volatinia jacarina Seen briefly hopping up and down in the grass at RAV.
- 166. White-collared Seedeater *Sporophila torqueola* Seen commonly at various places including the airport at San Pedro Sula.
- 167. Thick-billed Seed-Finch *Oryzoborus funereus* Nice looks at a male along the road at LBG.
- 168. Yellow-faced Grassquit *Tiaris olivaceus* Wonderful looks at a male at SNR.
- 169. Buff-throated Saltator Saltator maximus Good looks as it fed in Cecropia at LPB.
- 170. Rose-breasted Grosbeak *Pheucticus Iudovicianus* Several sightings in our walks at LPB and also at LBG and SNR.
- 171. Blue Grosbeak *Passerina caerulea* Seen by some on our trip to CYS.
- 172. Indigo Bunting Passerina cyanea Male seen well in field near river at RAV.
- 173. Melodious Blackbird *Dives dives* Several sighted walking the grounds at LPB.
- 174. Great-tailed Grackle Quiscalus mexicanus Very frequently sighted on our various rides and various stops.
- 175. Bronzed Cowbird Molothrus aeneus Flock seen along the roadside on our drive from the airport to LPB.
- 176. Giant Cowbird *Molothrus oryzivorus* Several were among the nests of the Montezuma Oropendola colony at LBG.
- 177. Black-cowled Oriole *Icterus prosthemelas* We saw this species several times from the veranda at LPB.
- 178. Orchard Oriole *Icterus spurius* Seen by some at one of our stops at RAV.
- 179. Spot-breasted Oriole *Icterus pectoralis* Seen briefly on the drive from the airport and also at a roadside stop on the way to CYS.
- 180. Altamira Oriole *Icterus gularis* Seen by some at HER.
- 181. Baltimore Oriole *Icterus galbula* Seen commonly at various stops and around LPB.
- 182. Chestnut-headed Oropendola *Psarocolius wagleri* Observed around LPB coming to the fruit feeders.
- 183. Montezuma Oropendola *Psarocolius Montezuma* Seen very well at LPB and at LBG. Also seen flying here and there along the road on our various drives.
- 184. House Sparrow Passer domesticus We found some of these ubiquitous birds at the breakfast stop at RAV.

## OTHER SPECIES:

- 1. Central American Agouti Dasyprocta punctata Commonly seen around the grounds at LPB.
- 2. White-nosed Coati *Nasua narica* Several sightings at LPB by various among us. Some of us had Coatis coming to our fruit feeder at our cabins.
- 3. Mantled Howler Monkey -- Alouatta palliata A small group lounging in the riverside trees at CYS.
- 4. Proboscis (Long-nosed) Bat -- *Rhynchonycteris naso* Four bats on a sign roosting as they habitually do at CYS.
- 5. Margay Leopardus weidii A female rescue animal relaxing in the bar at SNR.
- Boa Constrictor Boa constrictor Excellent looks at one crossing the entrance road into LPB on the night of our arrival.
- 7. Blunt-headed Tree-Snake *Imantodes cenchoa* Pointed out to some of us by James Adams, a small snake with a big head.
- 8. Anole Lizard Anolis spp. Several of these common lizards were seen around the grounds at LPB.
- 9. Brown Basilisk Basiliscus cf. Vittatus The long-tailed lizard with the big crest was seen by most of us at LPB.
- 10. Mediterranean House Gecko *Hemidactylus turcicus* Usually heard rather than seen, this common gecko was in some of our cabins and one was visible at the restaurant at SNR.
- 11. Green Iguana Iguana iguana Seen at the fields around the airport and very well at CYS.
- 12. American Crocodile *Crocodylus acutus* Seen partly hidden among the mangrove roots at CYS.
- 13. Black River Turtle Rhinoclemmys funerea Pointed out by Gus in a small roadside pond at LBG.
- 14. Common Blue Morpho *Morpho helenor* Hard to miss this sensational and conspicuous butterfly. We saw it daily at LPB and also at LBG.
- 15. Red Postman *Heleconius erato* This colorful sun-loving long-winged butterfly was seen daily at the flowers at the Registration building at LPB.
- 16. Black Witch Ascalapha odorata This large butterfly spent time on the wall of the lounge area at LPB.
- 17. Calico Butterfly *Caligo telamonius* Sometimes called the Yellow-fronted Owl, some of us saw this large butterfly around LPB.
- 18. Hercules Beetle Dynastes hercules Huge beetle seen on the white "moth attractor sheet" at LP



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
